Traditional British Pimm's – Wimbledon's Favourite Cocktail

(A light summer drink)

Prep Time 10 mins

Total Time 10 mins

Servings: 3

Calories: 163kcal

Ingredients

- 250 ml (~ 1 cup) Pimm's No.1
- 500 ml (~ 2 cups) sparkling lemonade – I used diet
- 1/2 orange, cut into chunks
- 5 fresh strawberries, cut into chunks
- 4-inch piece of cucumber, cut into chunks
- Small bunch fresh mint, roughly torn
- 10 ice cubes



Dr. Victoria Plaskett, OCT is an English teacher (retired) with 35 years of experience in Ontario classrooms, part-time professor of special education at University of Toronto, a volunteer for 15 summers with teachers in Jiangsu Province, China, a year teaching high school in Nanjing, China, followed by a year as literacy instructor at a high school in Arviat, Nunavut. Dr. Plaskett completed undergraduate studies at Western University and earned a doctorate at University of Toronto (2000) in Human Development and Applied Psychology with her thesis on resilience. Her teaching-travel focuses on the importance of cultural exchange and living in community. Her book, "Sewing Lessons: My Year in Arviat, Nunavut" will be completed in summer 2021.

Brief Description of Presentation

Dr. Plaskett's talk, "Sewing Lessons: My Year in Arviat, Nunavut" focuses on the vital importance of cultural exchange and living in community. She will share experiences of her amazing arrival in the treeless, snow covered tundra, the symbolism of the ulu and joining a women's sewing group to make seal fur mittens with Susan, teaching in the north to the third generation after residential schools, being "on the land" with blizzards, igloos, northern lights, polar bears and caribou, and the hot tea and warm bannock, love and belly laughs of life in a northern community.

COVID and BRIDGE

For the past three months we have been talking about some difficult hands to bid. These hands look straight forward but can trap you. This month we have another problem hand. Look at this hand. (Spades) 1093, (Hearts) AQ1074, (Diamonds) AK10, (Clubs) K4. What do you bid? You have a 5 card heart suit. You have a good opening bid (16 High card points). Let's say you fall into the trap and open 1 heart. Partner bids 1 spade. What do you bid now? You can't bid 2 spades. (Partner may have a 4 card suit and you would have 7 trump.) A bid of 1NT shows only 13 to 15 points and is an underbid. (You may have game.) A bid of 2NT shows 18 or 19 points and is an overbid. (You may go down.) You do not have another suit to bid. The problem was with the first bid. You should have opened 1NT. I know you were told never to open 1NT with a 5 card major. Here is a rule. If you have a 5 card heart suit and a 5,3,3,2 distribution and 15 to 17 high card points consider opening the hand in 1NT. Remember Alvin Roth's good advice: Don't make your first bid until you know what your second bid will be.

BUTTER TARTS (Susan Phillips)

Pastry:

1 1/4 cups (175 grams) all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon (14 grams) granulated white sugar
1/2 cup (113 grams) unsalted butter, chilled, and cut into 1 inch (2.54 cm) pieces
1/8 to 1/4 cup (30 - 60 ml) ice water

Butter Tart Filling:

1/3 cup (70 grams) unsalted butter, softened
1 cup (215 grams) light brown sugar
2 large eggs
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
1/4 cup (60 ml) light cream (half-and-half) (10% butterfat)
1/2 cup raisins or 1/2 cup pecans or walnuts (toasted and chopped) (optional)

Instructions:

Pastry: In a food processor, place the flour, salt, and sugar and process until combined. Add the butter and process until the mixture resembles coarse meal (about 15 seconds). Pour 1/8 cup (30 ml) water in a slow, steady stream, through the feed tube until the dough just holds together when pinched. If necessary, add more water. Do not process more than 30 seconds. *(Note from Susan: I don't have a food processor and they still turn out great)*

Turn the dough onto your work surface and gather into a ball. Flatten into a disk, cover with plastic wrap, and refrigerate for about one hour before using. This will chill the butter and relax the gluten in the flour.

After the dough has chilled sufficiently, place on a lightly floured surface, roll out the dough and cut into 12 - 4 inch (10 cm) rounds. (To prevent the pastry from sticking to the counter and to ensure uniform thickness, keep lifting up and turning the pastry a quarter turn as you roll (always roll from the center of the pastry outwards).) Gently place the rounds into a 12-cup muffin tin. Cover and place in the refrigerator for about 30 minutes to firm up the dough. Next, make the filling.

Butter Tart Filling: In the bowl of your electric mixer, or with a hand mixer, cream the butter and sugar. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, and then the vanilla extract. Stir in the cream. If using nuts and/or raisins, place a spoonful in the bottom of each tart shell and then fill the unbaked tart shells with the filling. Bake at 375 degrees F (190 degrees C) for about 15 - 20 minutes or until the pastry has nicely browned and the filling is set. Remove from oven and place on a wire rack to cool. Serve at room temperature or chilled.

Makes 12 - 4 inch tarts.





THE BOOKWORM



I lived in Arviat, Nunavut between 2017 and 2018, a hamlet of 2,600 people on the west coast of Hudson Bay, above the tree line, about 260 miles north of Churchill, Manitoba. On pre-1989 maps it is called Eskimo Point.

I taught English literacy at John Arnalukjuak High School, joined women's sewing groups to make seal fur mittens, cross country skied on the frozen Hudson Bay, wrote in my journal and read.

While learning about Arviat's rich history, I stumbled upon, "Walking on the Land" written by Farley Mowat in 2000. His first book, "People of the Deer" written in 1952, followed by, "The Desperate People" in 1959 first brought issues of the Inuit to light in fictionalized accounts that the government discounted and no one would believe because they were so horrific.

"Walking on the Land" is less verbose and dramatic than Farley Mowat's usual writing style. Instead, it is calm, understated and literary, rich with symbolism and powerful truths. He was 80 years old when it came out.

In the 1950's, the Ahiarmuit people living inland, west of Ennadai Lake were moved several times by the Canadian government, to Nueltin Lake, Henik Lake, and Arviat, then to Whale Cove and Rankin Inlet.

The government had built a radio station in 1949 near Ennadai Lake and officials worried the Inuit would become too dependant on trade with federal employees instead of hunting caribou. Meanwhile, the Hudson Bay encouraged the Inuit to trap white fox, and when the European and Chinese market for furs dried up, the Hudson Bay simply left. The Inuit people, who took pride in their caribou tracking and hunting skills, were starving.

When Ahiarmuit were moved, government officials destroyed their tents, tools and sleds and shot their dogs. This led to exposure, starvation and death.

Many walked back to their original homes.

"Walking on the Land" tells about Hallauk and his wife Kikkik, their five children and Kikkik's half brother Ootek. Starving, Ootek shot Hallauk, and tried to shoot Kikkik but she overpowered him and stabbed him. Kikkik started walking in the snow with her youngest in her amauti (the hood of her parka), pulling two girls on a sled. Facing exhaustion, she buried the two girls under the snow and kept walking until she reached Padlei. Later the RCMP found the girls. One girl was still alive.

Farley Mowat meets with Elisapee Karetak, the child in Kikkik's amauti who survived that long trek in the snow so long ago. Today she is a documentary filmmaker and educator living in Arviat.

In 2019 the federal government issued an apology to the Ahiarmuit people with ceremonies in Arviat. They received a \$5 million settlement, with \$100,000 to 21 survivors, and \$3,000 to 164 children of survivors.

Elisapee Karetak's documentary, "Kikkik" directed by Ole Gjerstad has been produced in both English and Inuktitut and is available on-line on Vimeo (2011).

For life in Nunavut, I recommend the TVO documentary, "There is a House Here" produced by Alan Zweig.

For how the Canadian government carried out plans for assimilation by sending three young boys to Ottawa high schools and how those boys grew up to become leaders in the formation of Nunavut, the largest indigenous governed territory in the world, watch, "Experimental Eskimo" available on Vimeo.

And I'm working hard to finish writing my book of memoirs, "Sewing Lessons: My Year in Arviat, Nunavut."
