Revised: COVID-19 PROTOCOL PROBUS CLUB OF AJAX

The PROBUS Club of Ajax is a private social club for seniors. Given the ages of our members, it is imperative that safety be our highest priority. Our Club must manage the risk of COVID-19, as we re-introduce in-person meetings and activities. Even though the Province of Ontario has lifted Proof of Vaccination and masking requirements, the Management Committee has decided to still require proof of vaccination and ask that masks continue to be worn for the foreseeable future for <u>all in-person gatherings</u> of the PROBUS Club of Ajax.

All participants must be <u>fully vaccinated for COVID-19</u>. In addition, a minimum of two weeks must have passed since the second shot was administered. These vaccination requirements include, but are not limited to, our monthly membership meetings, interest group activities, and social events. <u>We ask that masks be worn at the General Meetings and any in-door activities other than when meals are served.</u>

This is how it will work:

- a) When you attend your first in-person membership meeting, bring your proof of vaccination (either the receipt you were given when you received the vaccination or the <u>Ontario Government Vaccine</u> <u>Certificate</u>). Your name will be recorded as having shown proof of vaccination when you enter the meeting room. <u>Admittance to the room will not be allowed if your Vaccination Receipt is not</u> <u>provided</u>. The Social Co-ordinator, Interest Group Co-ordinator and House Co-ordinator for membership meetings, will have access to a list of fully vaccinated Club members, and use this list when approving attendance at their respective activities so you will not need show your proof of vaccination after your first in-person meeting.
- b) This COVID-19 Protocol will be implemented at our Club's first in-person membership meeting. If there are any interest group activities or social events sanctioned by the PROBUS Club of Ajax, which occur prior to the first in-person membership meeting, then you must provide proof of vaccination at that time in order to participate in same.
- c) If you decide not to be vaccinated for COVID-19, you may attend any virtual events offered by the PROBUS Club of Ajax. This includes our Hybrid membership meetings, and Interest Groups provided on Zoom and Trickster. If you are not vaccinated, do not attend any in-person meetings, interest group activities or social outings etc. held by the PROBUS Club of Ajax.
- All COVID-19 Province of Ontario Regulations and Public Health Guidelines in effect at the time of the PROBUS Club of Ajax in-person gathering will prevail, including group size, physical distancing, mask requirements etc.


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MEMBERS CORNER

April 6-Marnie Bickle


Speaker Introduction:

Author/editor of a book, "Native Born Son" which is available from Amazon. "Native Born Son" is J. David Ford's first-hand telling of his suspenseful exploits while growing up in the eastern Arctic during the 1920's and 1930's. He was born into a multi-generational line of traders, trappers and Hudson's Bay Company employees who, since the late 1700's, lived alongside and sometimes intermarried with indigenous people. This social history depicts life at the end of an era-before radio communication, snowmobiles or power boats - a nomadic life on the verge of extinction. An account of early colonialism in the Arctic, working for Hudson's Bay, and how their son grew and became integrated into the Arctic life.

Speaker Bio:

Marnie Bickle worked most of her career in music academia and lives in Port Hope with her husband and two cats. Marnie found journals in her attic, and now, 100 years after the eight-year-old David Ford first set foot on Coats Island at the top of the Hudson Bay, those journals have been given new life in her edited book, "Native Born Son." Always a writer at heart, she also combined her interest in music and history to write, "Opera and the University of Toronto 1972-1996" and other articles to promote and showcase classical musicians. She looks forward to finding new stories that need to be told.


Speaker Introduction

Denise worked at the Hamilton Spectator for 26 years where she won a National Newspaper Award, was twice honoured with Journalist of the Year by the Ontario Newspaper Awards and received four national journalism fellowships which allowed her to write and travel around southeast Asia.

BRIDGING THE GAP BRIDGE

What does it mean when dealer opens 1 diamond and the next player bids 2 diamonds? This is called a cue bid. For the next few columns, I will be discussing two types of cue bids called "Michaels" and "Unusual No Trump".

Here is an example. Opener bids 1 club or 1 diamond. Bid openers suit with hands like these. (Spades) KJ965 (Hearts) A96432 (Diamonds) 5 (Clubs) 4 OR (Spades) AKJ96 (Hearts) AQ964 (Diamonds) A5 (Clubs) 3. If they bid 1 diamond bid 2 diamonds. If they bid 1 club bid 2 clubs.

Note that each hand has 5 or 6 cards in each of the major suits. This is called "Michaels" cue bid. Although each hand is similar in distribution having at least 5 cards in each major suit, they are different in high card points. The first hand has 8 High Card points and the second hand has 18 high card points. Also note that in the first hand with a few High Card points the points are concentrated in the two major suits. You would not make a cue bid with a hand like this: (Spades) J9652 (Hearts) 98643 (Diamonds) K5 (Clubs) A.

How do you know if the cue bidder has a weak hand or strong hand? With a strong hand he will bid again. With a weak hand he will pass.

To play, you have to guess the word in 6 or fewer tries. After each guess, the colour of the tiles will change to show how close your guess was to the word.

If you have the right letter in the right spot, it shows up green. A correct letter in the wrong spot shows up yellow. A letter that isn't in the word in *any* spot shows up gray.

Simple stuff, but also incredibly compelling

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The letter ${\boldsymbol W}$ is in the word and in the correct spot.



The letter ${\bf L}$ is in the word but in the wrong spot.



The letter **U** is not in the word in any spot.

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
Rambles with my Camera – Snowy Owls

A prize for any bird photographer, well any birder, any photographer, or anyone for that matter, is to see a Snowy Owl in Southern Ontario. What a treat to see this magnificent white bird so far from home! The year-round home of the Snowy is mainly on the tundra of North America but they may spend some winters in southern Canada and northern United States, especially when food sources are scarce during Arctic winters.

In our area, they may be seen in a variety of places wherever they can search for a meal of rodents and small mammals such as fields and highways. However, a favourite spot for this opportunistic bird has consistently been along shorelines and boat marinas where there is some open water and ducks for lunch.

My first Snowy owl was at the Colonel Samuel Smith Park marina, Etobicoke. It was a barely recognizable lump on the dock which didn't seem to move. The next one was on an icy breakwater in Cobourg Harbour on a frozen New Year's Day. It is still one of my favourite photographs. Since then, I have spotted a Snowy two more years in a row sitting on the same lighthouse in Cobourg harbour. One would hardly notice without binoculars or a long lens, the two whitish lumps sitting atop the lighthouse, a lamp, and an owl. The closest to home was during one of our PROBUS walks at the marina at Frenchman's Bay. She was sitting on a dock looking like she had just enjoyed lunch.



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THE BOOKWORM



Ten years ago, I trekked the Himalayas in Nepal on a route known as the "Annapurna Sanctuary." Starting and ending in the capital of Kathmandu, we drove to Pokhara to climb eight hours a day for ten days up and down stone mountain steps to a height of 4,130 metres to Annapurna Base Camp (ABC) with a spectacular view of the snow-covered mountain peaks.

Before the trip I was inspired reading Conor Grennan's memoir, "Little Princes-One Man's Promise to Bring Home the Lost Children of Nepal" (2011). A 29-year-old University of Virginia graduate looking for fun and adventure, Conor decided on a year of travel beginning with a three-month volunteer stint at an orphanage in Nepal, mostly to impress women friends with his altruistic spirit. At first Conor is uncertain of his skills or passion to really get involved in the lives of these rambunctious children in a developing country in the midst of civil war. But he is soon challenged and rewarded by his work. With simple meals of rice and dal, wearing the same clothes every day, their resilient spirit soon wins Conor's heart.

But slowly he learns the unthinkable truth, that these children are not in fact orphans at all. Child traffickers were promising families in remote villages to protect these children from the civil war for a huge fee by taking them to safety. They would then abandon the children far from home in Kathmandu.

Conor leaves the orphanage at the end of his three months, but his heart soon leads him back with a commitment to reunite all the lost children with their families. That decision means he will risk his life while travelling through the mountains of Nepal, facing dangers of the civil war and suffering a debilitating injury. Waiting for him back in Kathmandu and hopeful that he will make it out of the snow-covered mountains alive is a woman he met once, a woman who shares his passion for the lost children, a woman that he loves.

"Little Princes" is an adventure story, a survival story, a story of how love can open doors, and how one person can make a difference faced with seemingly insurmountable odds.

My trip to Nepal began in Kathmandu at Monkey Temple and I retraced Conor's steps to the local coffee shops and *momo* or beef dumpling shop where he met his contacts. After my trek I wandered the maze of lanes behind the temple and found, "Umbrella" a small house, a secret haven to protect young victims of Nepal's sex trafficking rings described in Conor's book.

Our group ate dinner at, "Rum Doodle," a restaurant in the heart of Kathmandu where mountain trekking history is literally written on the walls. Sir Edmund Hillary's signature is there. At "Rum Doodle" the ceiling is hung with thousands of paper footprints signed by trekkers, including mine, with my proud little drawing of the red and white maple leaf.

I've followed Conor Grennan's path over the years, how he went on to start the NGO, "Next Generation Nepal" and how the love story turns out. But to find out about that, you'll have to read the book yourself.
