

Breaking the Silence: Veterans' Untold Stories from the Great War to Afghanistan.**

FROSTY FIELDS OF UXBRIDGE

December 13 – I was going to spend the day cleaning my kitchen after some holiday baking but then – a last minute invitation from a friend to go for a country drive. Not a difficult choice. We went somewhere north of Uxbridge. How unexpectedly beautiful! The right time to see the whole rural universe cloaked in hoarfrost.

We actually did the country drive on the way for my friend to find a rare bird which was way out of its home range and should have been in Northern California. So that is why the two of us eventually found ourselves on that rural road north of Uxbridge. That is a girl who is much more of a serious birder than I am! We actually found it – a Townsend's Solitaire which must have been surviving on frozen berry trees.

I don't know how anyone could ever find this plain looking bird along these country roads but there is a network of birders who report on these sightings. I usually just rely on serendipity but the quest this day did make for an enchanting drive. We did see some other local birds on our trip but the Townsend's was the highlight.

RECIPES OF THE MONTH





1½ - 2lbs ground lamb
2 large eggs, lightly beaten
2 tbsps plain yoghurt or tahini
¾ cup dry breadcrumbs
2 tbsps dried parsley
2 cloves chopped garlic

Spice mix

1½ tsps ground cumin1½ tsps coriander1 tsp paprika1 tsp turmeric

1 tsp salt + dash of pepper

1 tsp cardamon

½ tsp ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp cayenne pepper (or more to taste)

- 1. Preheat the oven to 375°F and brush or spray a *loaf pan with a little olive or avocado oil.
- 2. Combine the spice mix in a bowl.
- 3. Add the ground lamb, egg, yoghurt, breadcrumbs, parsley, and garlic.
- 4. Combine thoroughly and place in the pan.
- 5. Bake uncovered for approximately 50 minutes or until a thermometer inserted in the centre of the meatloaf registers 150°F.
- 6. Remove from the oven and allow the meatloaf to rest for 10 minutes before slicing.
 - * If you don't have a loaf pan, shape the mixture into a small rounded loaf and bake on a prepared roasting pan.

MOROCCAN VEGETABLE COUSCOUS




2 medium diced carrots
1 small diced red onion
1 diced zucchini
4 tbsp olive oil
2 tbsp lemon juice
2 tsp minced garlic
1 tsp ground cumin
1 tsp ground coriander
½ tsp ground cinnamon
1 tsp salt + ¼ tsp pepper

1 large diced bell pepper

1½ cups dry couscous 1½ cups chicken broth ½ tsp turmeric ½ cup raisins or chopped dried apricots (optional) * 1 (14 oz) can chickpeas

3 tbsp fresh or dried cilantro 2 tbsp fresh or dried mint (optional)

- 1. Preheat oven to 475 degrees.
- 2. Place bell pepper, carrots, onions and zucchini on baking sheet.
- 3. Drizzle with 1 tbsp olive oil.
- 4. Roast in preheated oven about 15 minutes until tender.
- 5. In a small mixing bowl whisk together remaining 3 tbsp olive oil, lemon juice, garlic, cumin, coriander, cinnamon, salt and pepper.
- 6. Bring chicken broth and turmeric to a boil.
- 7. Place couscous and raisins/apricots in a large mixing bowl, pour hot chicken broth over and stir.
- 8. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and let stand for 5 minutes until couscous softens.
- 9. Add roasted vegetables, chickpeas, cilantro, mint and lemon mixture and toss to coat.
 - * To remove the sugars from chickpeas, soak in cold water for several hours or overnight, rinse and drain well.

Maggie MacKenzie, from the Richmond Hill Heritage Services, presented the fascinating history of the Richmond Hill David Dunlap Observatory (RHDDO) which throughout the 19th century was a family farm.

astronomical research centre housing the largest telescope in Canada - the second largest in the world. Their research discovered the first direct evidence that Cygnus X-1 was a black hole, as well as providing pioneering measurements of the distance to globular clusters and the discovery that Polaris was stabilizing.
